

# 2014 Community Impact Snapshot



From April 1, 2013 to March 31, 2014, Nonprofits Assistance Fund made 105 loans totaling over \$14 million. These loans represent a wide range of communities, clients, budget and staff sizes, and fields of service. As a part of the loan application process, applicants provide summary information about their services and clients. This information serves as a basis for Nonprofits Assistance Fund to measure the number of people who ultimately benefit from the financing, strategic guidance and other resources we provide.

## Charter Schools & Education

- 29 loans to charter schools totaling \$4,169,264. They employ 743 FTE staff and educate **4,914 students**. 96% of the schools serve low-income students.

## Arts & Humanities

- 22 arts and humanities organizations with \$1,955,642 in loans, including:
  - 14 theaters,
  - Four musical performance organizations
  - Three visual arts organizations,
  - Two dance performance companies, and
  - One literary press
- These arts organizations employ **159 FTE** staff and provide contract work for performers, tech crews, designers, educators, and others.

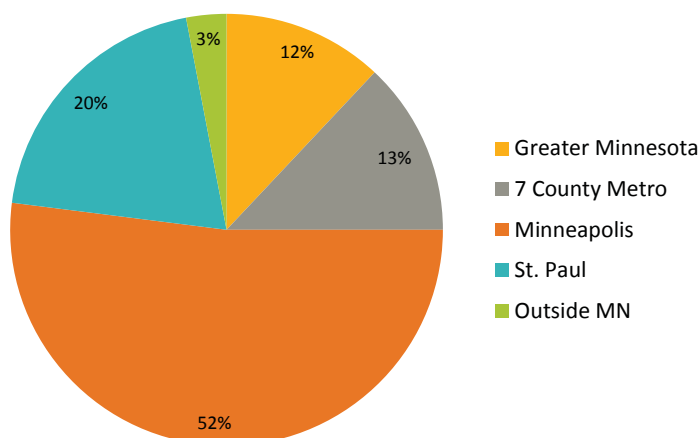
## Health Care

- 13 organizations with \$2,569,449 in loans, providing work to 893 FTE employees.
- **89%** of the organizations serve **low-income patients** with **sliding fees** and **public programs**.
- Health care borrowers serve a total of 150,089 patients for primary care, dental, and mental health services.

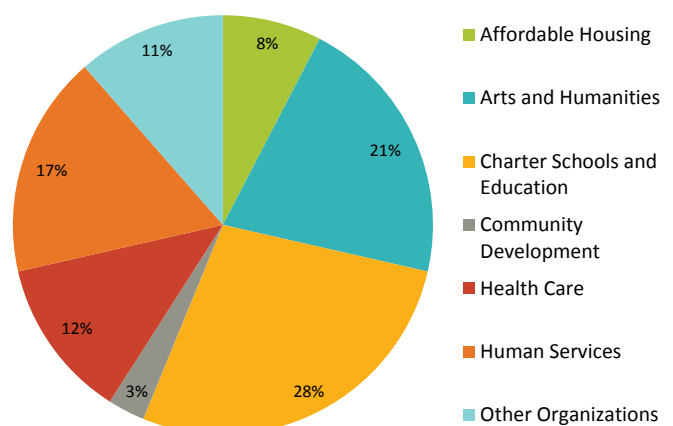
## Human Services

- 18 organizations with \$1,733,923 in loans, employing 562 FTE staff.
- **90%** serve **low-income** individuals and families.

## Affordable Housing

- Eight affordable housing organizations with \$1,834,723 for predevelopment costs for new projects in St. Paul and Minneapolis. These organizations serve over **15,522 low-income individuals** and **families**.

## Community Development

- Three community development organizations with \$389,883 in loan balances that develop commercial projects, organize and advocate for local priorities, and connect and bridge neighborhoods.
- 58 FTE staff members work for these organizations, serving **7,711 individuals** in **54% low-income neighborhoods**.

## Other Organizations

We loaned approximately \$1,662,000 to 12 organizations serving Minnesota and surrounding communities through **sustainable food systems, wildlife preservation** and **rehabilitation, youth development** and **civic engagement**.

## Employment

The nonprofit sector represents approximately 10% of the employment base in Minnesota. Our borrowers this year **employ 2,974 FTE** in positions including management, professional, administrative and direct service providers in **105 different nonprofit organizations**.
